






EXAMPLE 1: NATURE RESTORATION REGULATION

Article 8 - Restoration of urban ecosystems

By 2030... no net loss (compared to 2024)

From 2031... increasing trend ... until « satisfactory level »

- in urban **green space** (at national level)
- in urban **tree canopy cover** (in each urban ecosystem area)




